GOC, NHA, SINU sign Venue Use Agreement

he Games Organizing Committee (GOC), the National Hosting Authority (NHA) and the Solomon Islands National University (SINU) this month, signed a Venue Use Agreement that would allow for the use of SINU facilities before and during the 2023 Pacific Games.

As part of the agreement, SINU had granted the rights for the use of its three campuses namely; SINU Kukum Campus, SINU Ranadi Campus and SINU Panatina Campus to be used as venues to conduct Games events come next year's Sol2023 Pacific Games.

Speaking at the signing, SINU Acting Vice Chancellor Dr Jack Maebuta said that SINU is committed to supporting the Solomon Islands Government deliver a successful 2023 Pacific Games.

"The willingness and participation of the Venue Use Agreement is a testament and demonstration of our support to the Solomon Islands Government to successfully host and deliver a memorable legacy and the best Pacific Games ever."

Dr Maebuta said that through the agreement, SINU has provided to the Pacific Games around 40 to 50% (percent) of its usable land to construct additional and related facilities for the delivery of the Games.

He added that SINU is proud to be partnering with GOC and NHA through the signing of the agreement with the aim of helping Solomon Islands host the best Pacific Games ever to be held in the region.

NHA Executive Director, Christian Nieng said that the signing marked yet another key milestone that the GOC

has achieved in its journey towards hosting next year's Pacific Games.

"NHA acknowledges the amount of time SINU and GOC staff had spent in going through the conditions stipulated in the agreement for Sol2023 to access SINU venues to be used as the Games village for the 2023 Pacific Games.



Mr Nieng added that SINU provides the largest athlete accommodation space needed for the Sol2023 Pacific Games, whilst also acknowledging the progress of all Committees under NHA – labeling preparations as being on track.

GOC Board Member, Mr Robert Iroga thanked SINU for its commitment in partnering with GOC and NHA – labeling the partnership as timely and critical.

"GOC sees this partnership with SINU as timely and critical towards delivering a successful Games next year," he said.

Mr Iroga meanwhile, also revealed that GOC is expecting all venues to be completed by June, 2023

GOC brief's PS's on Pacific Games 2023 progress

Permanent Secretaries from various Government Ministries were briefed on the Pacific Games 2023 at a meeting held at the Mendana Hotel last month.

The meeting organized by the Government Services Integration Committee (GSIC), of the Office of the Prime Minister and Cabinet was purposely to update Permanent Secretaries from all 24 Government Ministries on the status of Games preparations this year – leading up to next year's Pacific Games.

A statement from the Office of the Prime Minister and Cabinet says, the meeting provided an opportunity for Permanent Secretaries to be updated and keep abreast of the Games and the preparatory arrangements.

In his welcome address, Chair of the National Hosting Authority and Secretary to Prime Minister, Dr Jimmy Rodgers, thanked Permanent Secretaries for their attendance and highlighted the importance of the Games for Solomon Islands, and the crucial role played respective Ministries in supporting the Games Organization Committee (GOC) in delivering the 2023 Pacific Games.

Speaking on the Sol2023 Pacific Games theme, "Challenge, Celebrate and Unite", Dr Rodgers said that the Pacific Games 2023 will be the single largest event held in the history of Solomon Islands, and will seek to unite the country.

Chief Executive Officer of the Games Organizing Committee, Peter Stewart, updated the meeting on the Games preparations and the work done to date for the Games. He added that with less than 14 months away, from the Games, the country is well ready and prepared for the Games.

The meeting also discussed the Ministerial Budgets needed to support the Games as well as relevant events during the Games, such as the Secondment of Government employers to the Games, as well as, the Safe and Green Games Strategic Action plan.

The Safe and Green Games Strategic Action plan, is the one single plan, that will draw all Government Ministries together, with all stakeholders, in supporting the successful delivery of the Pacific Games 2023.

The 17th Pacific Games will be held in Honiara, Solomon, Islands, from 19 November 2023 to 2 December 2023.

HONIARA Get Ready for November 19

The Sol2023 Pacific Games will be held November 19th to 2nd December, 2023.

The Games Organizing Committee (GOC) have began dialogues with the Government, the Solomon Islands National Institute of Sports (SINIS) and other key stakeholders in planning the event set for 19th November, 2022.

GOC's Marketing and Communications Manager, Laurel Tasa said that aim of the proposed event is to engage and interact with the public, provide awareness and share information about the Games.

She added that the significance of the event is to celebrate the milestones Solomon Islands has achieved since winning the bid to host the 2023 Pacific Games.

"We are proposing a parade from White River (west Honiara) to SINIS (on the morning of November 19, and then have the official program there in the afternoon.

"We are also planning to engage school students, former and current national athletes to represent the 24 sporting events that will be played and the 24 countries that will be competing in the parade on the day," she said.

Meanwhile the One-year-to-go event will also coincide with the Chef de Missions (CDM) visit to Solomon Islands and the launch of the Safe and Green Games Strategic Action plan also set for November.



Gov't, HCC discuss Safe & Green Games

he Government Services Integration Committee (GSIC), of the Office of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, held fruitful discussions with key Government officials from Government Ministries and the Honiara City Council on the Safe and Green Games Strategic Action Plan.

Discussions focused on the Safe and Green Games Strategic Action Plan as a whole of Government Approach encompassing all government ministries, HCC and stakeholders to support the Pacific Games 2023.

The discussions included key activities in the Safe and Green Games including the critical role of HCC as the Host City.

Honiara City Clerk Justus Denni said HCC is fully aware of the prominent role to play in preparations in the lead up and during the Pacific Games 2023.

Denni said HCC will continue to focus on its normal service delivery but will need further support from the National Government and other stakeholders to double its efforts during the Games.

He added there are plans and constraints but he is hopeful and looked forward for support to prepare and host the Pacific Games in 2023.

Permanent Secretaries and Deputy Secretaries from other Government ministries also contributed to the discussions on the specific and respective roles each ministry will play to support the preparations and hosting the Pacific Games 2023.

Chair and Coordinator GSIC-PG2023, Benard Bata'anisia urged all the ministries, HCC and stakeholders to work and partner together in preparations which is key to

Solomon Islands hosting a successful 2023 Pacific Games.

The discussions also included Ministerial Budgets needed to support the Games as well as relevant events during the Games, such as the Secondment of Government employees to the Games, as well as, the Safe and Green Games Strategic Action plan.



Contributions to discussions during the meeting were from key officials from the Government ministries including Ministry of Forestry, Ministry of Culture and Tourism, Ministry of Health and Medical Services, Ministry of Infrastructure Development, Ministry of Police, National Security and Prison Services, Ministry of National Development Planning and Aid Coordination, Ministry of Women, Youth & Children's Affairs and HCC.

Follow up meetings will be held with other key stakeholders on the Safe and Green Games Strategic Action plan before launching in November 2022 – a year before the Games.

The 17th Pacific Games will be held in Honiara, Solomon, Islands, from 19 November 2023 to 2 December 2023.

GOC meets with local broadcasters

he Games Organizing Committee (GOC) held a brief meeting with local freelance film makers, photographers and other key stakeholders in Honiara to discuss broadcast operations and coverage plans for the 2023 Pacific Games.

Chaired by GOC Broadcast Technical Leader Paul Vunituranga, discussions were based around high level broadcast models, broadcast right holders and multilateral and unilateral broadcasting coverage that will happen during the next year's Games.

Speaking to around 20 plus local freelancers in attendance, Mr Vunituranga said that the aim of the meeting was to give local broadcasters, film makers and photographers a broad picture of how broadcast operations would be like during the Games which will happen in Honiara from 19th November to 2nd December 2023.

"We would like to reach out to freelancers, independent

contractors to be part of GOC's delivery of the Games in terms of broadcast. Also, that there will be opportunities for local freelancers to be involved in broadcast."

Mr Vunituranga said that the priority will be to engage locals during the Games, adding that the purpose of the meeting is to see the status of broadcast infrastructure available in country, and what is needed from abroad. "The broadcasting area is a huge undertaking and it needs assistance from outside to support the Games organizing committee and the host broadcast.

"There will be opportunities to work full time going forward mid next year and GOC will be working on Expression of interests (EOI) in broadcasting areas as well as in terms of tender for Camera kits, etc," he said. Meanwhile GOC has clarified that at this stage, no broadcast companies or individuals in Solomon Islands or abroad has been given the broadcast rights to next year's Pacific Games.

Media Officials Enhance Understanding on PG2023 Responsibilities



to support the Pacific Games 2023 delivery have established greater understanding on their specific roles and responsibilities during a meeting at the Games Organising Committee (GOC) head office in Honiara this month (October).

Organised by the Government Services Integrated Committee (GSIC) in collaboration with the GOC and the Solomon Islands Institute of Sports (SINIS) media branches, the meeting noted the significance of proper coordination between the media branches to prevent duplication of roles and responsibilities in supporting the Games.

Chief Executive Officer of GOC Peter Stewart outlined the various roles and responsibilities of the GOC media branch which is ongoing during the preparation stages leading up to the actual Games event.

These included awareness on the Games preparations through various media platforms, community engagement programmes, updates on venues and facility progresses while messaging on the actual Games and general information for visiting athletes, the media, the public and international audiences are in progress.

Mr. Stewart also informed the meeting of plans towards accreditation of visiting overseas media and the development of the Games manual reporting guidelines for journalists.

Other issues on the media and communication budget, which, is funded by the Government and others were also discussed and clarified with greater understanding. Chair of the GSIC, Bernard Bata'anisia of the Prime Minister's Office who facilitated the meeting also discussed and clarified the Government's support services toward the Games and, specifically,

highlighted the Safe and Green Games Initiative, which, has a special committee to administer.

Director of the Government Communication Unit (GCU), George Herming commended the meeting, noting, that his Office will pool together resources and media personnel from the Government to provide support services to the GOC and SINIS media branches to advocate for the Games.

"We are excited about current communication plans established by GSIC, GOC and SINIS media branches and we look forward for more coordination and collaboration to advocate and to raise awareness to the public for the successful delivery of the Games," Mr Herming said.

The meeting acknowledged that the various PG23 media and communication branches play vital roles in providing relevant and appropriate information to the mainstream media, stakeholders, the general public and also supporting the promotion of Solomon Islands as the host country and a potential investment destination. personnel from the Government to provide support services to the GOC and SINIS media branches to advocate for the Games.





GOC-TNC Partnership, a natural fit

he Games Organizing Committee (GOC)'s partnership with The Nature Conservancy (TNC) Solomon Islands is a natural fit.

GOC Chief Executive Officer Peter Stewart highlighted this at a brief meeting held to formalize and strengthen the partnership between GOC and TNCSI = describing it a natural fit.

The GOC-TNC Solomon Islands partnership began in August this year following the 'Mascot' naming competition in which TNC was the major sponsor. "The 2023 Pacific Games is so pleased to be entering

into a partnership with The Nature Conservancy. "The fact that Solomon Islands represents the largest turtle hatchery in the pacific and the fact that the

Games Mascot is a sea turtle itself – makes the link between the Games and TNCSI a natural fit."

Mr Stewart said that through the partnership, GOC is hopeful that the messages Solo can help spread throughout all of Solomon Islands and the rest of the Pacific will help protect all sea turtles for many years to come.

TNC Solomon Islands Country Director Willie Atu said that as soon as a sea turtle was chosen to be the Games Mascot, TNCSI came forward straight away to sponsor its naming.

"We've been working with sea turtles in Solomon Islands for the last 30 or so years. All turtles are

endangered species and here in Solomon Islands, we have the largest rookeries for the Hawksbill turtle in the South Pacific.

"Studies we have done show that turtles are being harvested indiscriminately in our communities at an alarming consumption rate of 11,000 per year. "This means that a lot of the turtles that are harvested are juveniles and this will most certainly affect the population of turtles going forward into the future.

"That is why we see this partnership with the 2023 Pacific Games as a big opportunity for us – as a massive way forward to help enhance our work in protecting all sea turtles from extinction here in Solomon Islands and throughout the Pacific Region," Mr Atu said.





hoiseul province has been the highlight of Solo the Mascot's nationwide tour around Solomon Islands by far – with Solo given the honor of releasing a live turtle back into the sea.

It was on October 1st, 2022, at Boe Boe village-that as part of celebrating Solo's arrival, the villagers gave Solo the honor of releasing a live turtle back into a Marine Protected Area (MPA) between Boe Boe and Tagu Beach Resort, Choiseul province.

"The program here (Boe Boe Village) was indeed a highlight as it involved the release of a live turtle by Solo, the 2023 Pacific Games Mascot.

"We are all happy having to witness Solo, the Mascot releasing a turtle back into the sea.

"That is historical, that is special as it signifies our commitment to conserving sea turtles. It signifies the work done at ACMP (Arnavon Community Marine Park). "Seeing Solo, a sea turtle being the Games Official Mascot gives us even more joy." Boe Boe village Elder, Derald Daza Daniel said.

Mr Daniel echoed similar sentiments echoed by other provinces Solo has visited, that Solo's nationwide tour is already making people feel part of the Pacific Games. The National Hosting Authority (NHA)'s Gino Oti, who had been documenting all of Solo's tours since its public debut in August this year said that to capture such a special and historical moment where Solo knelt down, carried the turtle and released it back into the sea was indeed magical.

"It was just magical – I am lost for words to describe that sight," he said.

Statistics from The Nature Conservancy (TNC) Solomon Islands Office revealed that more than 11,000 sea turtles are harvested indiscriminately each year through spear



fishing in Solomon Islands waters.

TNCSI studies revealed that Green and Hawksbill turtles were the dominant harvest – a vast majority of these turtles being juveniles.

Earlier this month, the Games Organizing Committee (GOC) and TNCSI strengthened their partnership – committing to advocate and provide awareness on preserving sea turtles throughout Solomon Islands and the region.



HAWKSBILL TURTLES

the most consumed in Solomon Islands

Hawksbill turtles are the most consumed turtle species in the Solomon Islands.

A report by The Nature Conservancy (TNC) revealed that out of all turtle species, Hawksbill turtles were the dominant catches – harvested for subsistence purposes domestically.

It states that up to 11,000 turtles are harvested each year by spear fishers in the Solomon Islands, with Green and Hawksbill turtles' catches being the dominant.

"Studies we have done show that turtles are being harvested in communities indiscriminately – meaning that many of the turtles harvested in Solomon Islands are juveniles.

"The turtle consumption rate in Solomon Islands is around 11,000 per year. If we continue to kill it, it will be extinct," TNC Solomon Islands Country Director, Willie Atu said.

The report stated that in Solomon Islands turtles are harvested for subsistence purposes through free diving and spear fishing methods in shallow reefs all around the country.

"In Solomon Islands turtles are typically hooked, held or speared by free diving spear fishers. Often this occurs at night, when spear fishers use an underwater flashlight to search shallow reef slopes for resting reef fish, crayfish and turtles.

Mr Atu added that surveys TNC has conducted showed that a lot of adult turtles are mostly harvested near or on turtle nesting grounds across the country.

Mr Atu said that all five species of marine turtles in the Solomon Islands have been assessed at risk of extinction in the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red List as Vulnerable to Critically Endangered.

"Turtles are all endangered species.

"In the Solomon Islands we have the largest rookeries for the Hawksbill turtle in the South Pacific and the important message we would like to stress is that every 1000 hatch links of baby turtles that go out into the sea – only one will survive. And the unique thing about turtles is that this baby turtle will always come back and nest at that very same beach.

"It is also important to note that a baby turtle who goes out from our beaches will always come back and nest on that very same sport," Mr Atu said.

Meanwhile TNC is the official sponsors of 'Solo' the Sol2023 Pacific Games Mascot.

The Games Organizing Committee (GOC)'s Board Member Robert Iroga highlighted this at a gala hosted for Pacific Islands media delegates in Honiara last month (September).

The event, co-hosted by the GOC and MASI (Media Association of Solomon Islands) was aimed at updating the Pacific Media about Solomon Islands preparations for next year's Games.

It was also the opportunity for GOC to introduce Solo (the 2023 Pacific Games Mascot) to the regional media delegates.

"Solo the Mascot captures the spirit of the 2023 Pacific Games with a character that is representative of all regions and people of Solomon Islands."

Mr Iroga said Solo is a symbol of unity for the Pacific region come Sol2023 Pacific Games.

"Solo is and will be a symbol of unity at Games time as it advocates and reflects the Sol2023 Pacific Games theme to Challenge – Celebrate and Unite."

Solo then made a surprise appearance at the gala, sharing hugs, smiles, gifts and blowing kisses all around to the visiting regional media delegates.

GOC's Community Engagement and Special Events

Coordinator Jacquelyn Maeli gave a quick update on Solo's nationwide tour.

"Solo is indeed happy to meet and be amongst you all today despite its tight schedule visiting provinces throughout Solomon Islands.

"Solo has for the past two months been heavily involved in the Games Community Engagement Program (CEP) – touring provinces and meeting people throughout Solomon Islands."



The CEP involves Solo's nationwide Mascot tour (which will end early next year, 2023), followed by the Games Ambassadors tour and the Games Relay – which will launch 100 days away from Games time.

"This Community Engagement Program is aimed at getting the Games message out to as many people as possible, share information, raise awareness about the Games and its benefits throughout Solomon Islands.

"It is also aimed at involving, engaging and encouraging our citizens to take pride of the Games and of Honiara City – our national capital – the proud hosts of the 2023 Pacific Games, which we will host next year from November 19th to December 2nd, 2023," Jacquelyn said.

Meanwhile Solo's nationwide tour has so far covered six provinces namely; Guadalcanal, Isabel, Central Islands, Shortland Islands, Rennell and Bellona and Choiseul provinces.

Staff from the Games Organizing Committee (GOC), the National Hosting Authority (NHA) and the Games Facilities Committee all underwent a three-day intensive basic fire and emergency training conducted by the Royal Solomon Islands Police Force (RSIPF)'s Fire and Rescue Services. Organized by the GOC and facilitated by the Royal Solomon Islands Police Forces' (RSIPF) Fire and Rescue Services, the training focused covered various topics which include;

- Basic Fire Fighting (Fire Chemistry)
- Classification of Fire
- Fire Extinguishers
- Fire Extinguisher Operations Procedures
- Practical Firefighting
- and Evacuation Procedures (Roles and Responsibility of Floor).

"Fire trainings are very important.

"We the Fire and Rescue Services are fully committed to provide awareness and training to offices, communities and to people – especially staff who will be heavily involved in next year's Pacific Games.

"Our number one priority is to spread the message of fire safety to all Solomon Islanders," training facilitator, Inspector Philip Lugara said.

He said that the aim is to educate and equip GOC, NHA and GFC staff to prepared for any emergency situation. GOC's Human Resource Manager, McCleen Sarukiki said that such training is necessary and crucial for their staff. "The aim of getting our staff into this training was to equip and alert them about fire hazards in the work place, how to act safely in the event of any fire emergency situation and using the right equipment and procedures in any fire emergency situation.

"By undergoing this training, they (staff) will acquire the knowledge and skills to deal with fire situations and also help educate their families, their communities on basic fire safety," Mr Sarukiki said.

He added that the basic fire safety training was just the start of many more trainings to come for all Games Staff. All participants were given Certificates upon completing the training.

Meanwhile also this month, the GOC staff underwent a weeklong First Aid training facilitated by the Red Cross Solomon Islands.







The Games Organizing Committee (GOC) took part in this year's International Day of Peace (IDP) program held at the Justice Ground in Honiara last month (September). Declared by the United Nations General Assembly, the 21st of September each year is to be observed as the International Day of Peace – devoted to strengthening the ideals of peace through observing 24 hours of nonviolence and cease-fire.

This year's IDP celebrations under the theme End Racism, Build Peace' was organized for by the Ministry of Traditional Governance, Peace and Ecclesiastical Affairs – aimed at helping Solomon Islands build a culture of peace for the betterment of its future.

During the event, GOC conducted Games awareness, Games updates and quizzes – also providing information on how the Games can be leveraged in promoting peace and unity.

Speaking on the Pacific Games contribution to peace in Solomon Islands, GOC Communications Coordinator Jeremy Inifiri said that next year's Games itself is a unifying factor the promotes peace and unity.

He said that the Pacific Games promotes understanding and tolerance across the pacific.

"From 19th November to 2nd December 2023, Solomon Islands will host 24 Pacific Island nations, around 5000 plus athletes and officials all united by a single event – the Pacific Games.

"During this event new friendships will be built, ideas shared, cultures promoted amongst athletes and team officials residing together at the Games village."

Mr. Inifiri added that the Games Community Engagement Program (CEP) is already proving to unite Solomon Islands

through Solo the Mascot.

"As part of the Games CEP, Solo will travel all nine provinces in Solomon Islands the next four months with the aim of informing, advocating, educating and engaging all Solomon Islanders to feel connected to and with the Games.



"This strategy is aimed at getting the message out to as many people as possible, share information, raise awareness and encourage all Solomon Islanders to take pride of the Games and of Honiara (the host City).

"Solo is expected to complete touring all provinces by early next year. This will be followed by the Ambassadors tour and then Games Relay which will take place 100 days before the start of next year's Games," Mr. Inifiri said. The 2022 IDP also coincided with 20th Anniversary of the UN Resolution on the program of action on a culture of peace throughout the world.
